You will also be equipped with the necessary analytical and methodological tools to understand and implement evaluation and evidence-based practice in criminal justice. The thorough engagement with quantitative and qualitative research methods and their application in your dissertation will further encourage you to find innovative approaches or solutions to key issues criminal justice professions are faced with.
